
Faculty and Alumni Highlights



Dr. Nancy Breland, faculty member at TCNJ for 34 years before retiring in 2006, was well known by many for teaching PSY 101, Psychological Testing and Psychology and Art. She is also a nationally recognized quilter whose art has received numerous awards. You can see the photos of her quilts which now appear in our first floor hallway and art gallery. The quilt on the left displays many small images of the history of psychology and appeared in David Myer's textbook, *Psychology*, for many editions.

TCNJ alumnus Ian J. Wallace co-edited a new book called, "Applying to Graduate School in Psychology: Advice from Successful Students and Prominent Psychologists". This book provides prospective graduate students with the knowledge to bolster their confidence and have a competitive edge. This book delivers a student-centered perspective, fulfills the needs of applicants that "handbooks" neglect, and helps applicants improve their chances of getting into a psychology graduate program. It is published by the American Psychological Association (APA Books) and was released in May. Ian Wallace is currently a 5th year graduate student in the
