


The Department of Psychology had another productive and successful year! Check out our publications and

WHAT WERE YOUR FAVORITE PARTS OF BEING CHAIR FOR THE DEPARTMENT OF PSYCHOLOGY?

The thing that, to me, has been most enjoyable has been getting to know people in a different and often deeper way. I've taught at The College of New Jersey for 20 years, and these last five years I've been chair have given me an opportunity to interact with my long-time colleagues in new ways, and understand them differently, and even be helpful in ways that I couldn't be as a colleague but I could be as a chair. That personally has been a very satisfying part of it. It is really a wonderful community that we have.








Earlier this year, the psychology department held a contest for students to create a logo that incorporated both the concepts of diversity and psychology. Our winner is Kayla McKenna. Read more




